



Răzvan NICOLESCU is a digital anthropologist with research focus on the social consequences of new technologies on social relations, practices, political economy, and governance. He holds a BSc and MSc in software and networks for telecommunications from University Polytechnics of Bucharest and a PhD in social anthropology from University College London. He worked with several technologies, including social media, IoT, Distributed Autonomous Systems, and cyber insurance at University College London and Imperial College London. Between 2016 and 2019, Răzvan was member of the [PETRAS National Centre of Excellence for IoT Systems Cybersecurity](#).

Between 2016 and 2022, he used to teach a range of modules in anthropology at University College London.

Răzvan is the author of [Social media in southeast Italy: crafting ideals](#) (2016) and co-author of [How the world changed social media](#) (2016). He published in mainstream journals, including *Journal of Information Technology*, *Computers in Industry*, *Journal of Cultural Economy*, and *Ethnos*. Răzvan is dedicated to making research available and relevant to wider audiences. In 2016, he coproduced the Massive Open Online Course (MOOC) [Anthropology of Social Media](#) for FutureLearn UK, which has attracted 49k+ students from 200+ countries to date. Răzvan is member of [The Centre for Digital Anthropology](#) at University College London.

Răzvan is currently Fellow at the New Europe College and conducts ethnographic research in Bucharest on the relation between social trust and what is commonly known as ‘Fake News.’
